I argue that as living history interpreters render a particular place historic, align the past and present so they can step through time to that historical place, and then share stories about the past, their twenty-first century selves come to inhabit a nineteenth century past. Positioning themselves within these places, times, and stories, living history interpreters create collective historical memories for themselves and the visiting public.
