BERBER WORDS LIKE "GHRAM" USE A THROATY "GH" SOUND, COMMON IN SEMITIC AND AFRO-ASIATIC LANGUAGES. THE SUFFIXES -IK AND -NK SOUND LIKE "EEK" AND "ENK" RESPECTIVELY. THE STRESS USUALLY FALLS ON THE ROOT WORD, MAINTAINING A MELODIC TONE.

- EMPHASIZE THE VOWEL SOUNDS TO MAINTAIN CLARITY

In Amazigh (Berber), 'I Love You' can be said as 'Ghramt-ik' for speaking to a female and 'Ghramt-inek' when speaking to a male.

# ARE THERE ANY CULTURAL CONSIDERATIONS WHEN SAYING 'I LOVE YOU' IN MOROCCO?
