HOW TO FORM THE SIGN

To correctly perform the sign for "imagine," start by placing your dominant hand near your forehead with fingers slightly spread, resembling a flat or claw handshape. Then, move the hand outward or around the forehead area in a small circular or sweeping motion. This motion represents the creation or visualization of ideas within the mind. The non-dominant hand may remain stationary or support the dominant hand depending on stylistic preferences, but the focus remains on the dominant hand's movement near the head.
