In the 21 centuries from 206 BC until AD 1912, routine administrative tasks were handled by a special elite of scholar-officials. China's last dynasty was the Qing (1644-1912), which was replaced by the Republic of China in 1912, and in the mainland by the People's Republic of China in 1949. China was occasionally dominated by steppe peoples, most of whom were eventually assimilated into the Han Chinese culture and population.
